Program for July 28, 2005

A quick trip across town found us at the Shiloh Family Life Center, home of this summer's Rotary Camp. There we enjoyed a wonderful lunch while getting updated on how this summer's camp has influenced campers, counselors and volunteers. Ron Loomis from the CT Pre-Engineering Program (CPEP) opened the program with thanking Rotary for its contribution to this year's camp. CPEP has been operating in Connecticut for 17 years and currently is located in 12 urban school districts. They offer after school programs, field trips and Saturday programs exposing youths to hands on science experimentation. An increasing number of their graduates are attending college and one currently works with NASA. Marj Taggart Dedrick, who has taken over for Rotary this year, acknowledged that this summer was a lesson in enthusiasm and commitment for her. Reona Dyess-Dunham, Camp Director, introduced this summer's instructors. Many campers remarked on how they learned at Camp Rotary that they have talents and skills that hadn't been discovered at their schools.
